The National Competitiveness Center "TAYSEER" presents its Newsletter for the second quarter of 2020, highlighting the Kingdom's progress in the World Competitiveness Yearbook 2020, issued by the International Institute for Management Development IMD. In addition to a set of reforms to improve the business environment, as well as a set of government efforts to stimulate and support the private sector to confront covid-19 pandemic.

This newsletter also reviews NCC's participation in seminars, and virtual local and international meetings that took place during this period. In addition to the workshops organized by NCC, which aims to develop the Kingdom's legislative and regulatory environment to improve its ranking in global reports and indicators.





The Kingdom of Saudi Arabia continues its upward ascent in global competitiveness rankings. In the World Competitiveness Yearbook 2020 published by the International Institute for Management Development (IMD), the Kingdom is ranked as the 24th most competitive economy among the 63 countries covered by the report, up two positions from a year earlier. The Kingdom has moved up the ranking despite the economic conditions resulting from the coronavirus pandemic; and NCC has launched a media campaign to announce the results of the Kingdom's extraordinary progress in the report.

Commenting on the results, His Excellency Dr. Majid Al-Qasabi, Minister of Commerce and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Competitiveness Center said, "Our positive performance in the World

Competitiveness Yearbook 2020, despite the coronavirus economic conditions, evidence the deep reforms in the Kingdom's business environment. In addition to the awareness efforts to inform the private sector about developments in regulations and legislation, as well as government initiatives and programs envisioned by Vision 2030, which aims to raise the Kingdom's competitiveness. Moreover, the high level of transparency between the government and the private sector, and opening channels of communication between the two sectors. Our progress is the fruit of a unique model of cross-sectoral collaboration among more than 50 government entities, collectively dedicated to carrying out ambitious policy and regulatory reforms and improving the competitiveness assets of the Kingdom".





What NCC has accomplished during coronavirus pandemic

The National Competitiveness Center issued a report on the efforts made in light of the consequences of coronavirus pandemic. These efforts included dealing with the challenges of the private sector, by following up the implementation of reforms via holding more than 50 virtual meeting. In addition to discussing the economic situation

and the impact of the crisis on the business environment in cooperation with International organizations. NCC has made also specialized studies and research on the experiences of more than 40 countries imposed curfews (total / partial), then delivered the recommendations, which aims at supporting the private sector.

- Issuance of approval to delete Article (75) from the implementation law.
- Issuance of the noble high approval to publish the executive regulations of the commercial court law.
- Update the executive regulations of the government procurement and competition law.
- Issuing the movable assets rights law and its executive regulations.
- Issuing the regulations of conflict of interests and manners of those who implement the provisions of the government procurement and competition law.
- Issuance of approval that any amendment on electricity and energy prices will be applied after 30 days after the announcement of the amendment.

- Holding meetings with all committees affiliate to NCC, to follow up the progress in carrying out the tasks.
- Holding workshops with World Bank experts in the presence of a group of interested public and private sectors.
- Holding a workshop with an expert of the United Nations Organization in the field of classification of activities ISIC-4 in the presence of a number of those interested in the public sector.
- Issuance of approval of the Cabinet to provide electricity and water services to the beneficiaries according to the regular procedures without requiring any certification.

"The role of public opinion polling in the legislative process" workshop



The National Competitiveness Center held the virtual workshop "The role of public opinion polling in the legislative process .. reality and expectations", in cooperation with the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law - UNCITRAL, Luca Castellani, the legal officer in the secretariat of the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law (UNCITRAL). presented the workshop, in the presence of Her Excellency Assistance Minister to the Minster of Commerce and Director of the National Competitiveness Centre, Dr. Eiman Al-Mutairi. In addition to a number of officials and specialists from the public and private sectors, attended the workshop.

The workshop aims to benefit from UNCITRAL experiences and best practices in the area of public opinion polling when preparing draft regulations and the similar. The workshop included a comprehensive discussion of public opinion polls, the hopedfor role in developing laws and regulations at the national level. Moreover, the role of

laws and public policies in supporting the consultation process and public opinion polls, "UNCITRAL texts as a model". In addition, the importance of stakeholders' support for the polling process, and not delaying the legislative process with inappropriate views.

The Laws and Regulations Support Unit, recently established by a Cabinet decision, is concerned with seeking public and government entities opinions, through a unified electronic platform. Preparing survey forms, focusing on the importance of surveys in evaluating the draft laws and regulations; and similar, disseminating that to government entities, as well as providing observations and views on the results of the survey to the owner of the project.

The National Competitiveness Center is working to sign a memorandum of cooperation with the United Nations Secretariat represented by the Office of Legal Affairs regarding the financial contribution to the UNCITRAL Trust Fund.
